

The Decline of LGBTQ+ Rights in Russia: A Timeline







SYNOPSIS

In Putin's Russia, being LGBTQ+ is now a crime against humanity.

Against the backdrop of the 2018 World Cup, veteran human rights activist Peter Tatchell launches his sixth daring protest in Moscow, becoming the catalyst for exposing a hidden war against Russia's LGBTQ+ community.

Through intimate interviews, hidden camera footage, and unprecedented access, OPPRUSSIAN reveals the systematic destruction of queer lives under Putin's regime.

From Tatchell's dramatic arrest to today's state-sanctioned "Queer Purge," the film tracks the terrifying escalation of persecution that has led to mass arrests, frozen bank accounts, and forced exile. As Russia declares the entire LGBTQ+ community "extremists," ordinary citizens face up to 12 years in prison simply for being themselves.

OPPRUSSIAN is both a vital historical document and an urgent call to action, capturing a critical moment when the world can no longer look away.



KEY CHARACTERS - PROTAGONIST

MEET THE ALLY - PETER TATCHELL



- Veteran human rights activist with a 50-year history of challenging the Russian government's oppression of LGBTQ+ people.
- A key participant in six protests in Moscow between 2006 and 2018, defying bans and risking his own safety.
- Three times, he was arrested for his activism in Russia.
- Beaten semi-conscious in 2007
 Moscow pride march protest.
- In 2018, he staged a daring solo protest during the World Cup in Moscow, bringing the world's attention to the escalating crisis.

Former LGBT Sports Federation Member.

MISSING -ALEKSANDR AGAPOV

Former President, Russian LGBT Sports
Federation. Last seen advocating for
LGBTQ+ rights in sports. Current
whereabouts unknown - one of many
activists who have disappeared under the
new laws.



MILA UMA

Underground Activist. Leading resistance against escalating anti-LGBTQ+ persecution who has fled Russia like so many LGBTQ+ activists.

NADJA ARONTSCHIK

A Russian activist who bravely fought for LGBTQ+ rights in Russia before being forced into exile. Now studying human rights to continue the struggle from abroad.



ZOYA MATISOVA-ROSH

A dedicated psychologist who provided support to LGBTQ+ individuals through gay help phone lines before they were banned. Now living in exile, she continues to advocate for the community.



ANONYMOUS

A Russian activist who fled Moscow and now lives in London, working tirelessly to support the cause from outside Russia and raise international awareness.




Act One: The Warning Signs (2006-2011)

Through Peter Tatchell's Eyes

Witnessing the early signs of statesponsored homophobia and growing violence against activists.

Key Events

- 2006: First Moscow Pride ban Peter's initial protest.
- 2007: Brutally beaten semi-conscious by neo-Nazis while protesting.
- 2009: Eurovision protest and arrest, highlighting the increasing restrictions on freedom of expression.
- 2011: Escalating violence against activists and the shrinking space for LGBTQ+ rights.



Act Two: Escalating Crisis (2013-2018)

The World Looks Away

A pattern of repression spreads as the international community fails to act decisively.

Key Events

- 2013: "Gay Propaganda" law enacted, further restricting LGBTQ+ visibility and rights.
- 2014: Sochi Olympics International complicity in Russia's human rights abuses.
- 2017: Chechen "gay purge" begins, marking a terrifying escalation of violence and persecution.
- 2018: World Cup protest Peter's dramatic stand against the backdrop of a global sporting event.


Act Three: The Purge (2023-2024)

History Repeats

The complete criminalisation of LGBTQ+ existence and a descent into a full-fledged 'Queer Purge.'

Key Events

- 2023: LGBTQ+ organizations declared "extremist," marking a turning point towards open persecution.
- 2024: Mass arrests, imprisonment, and forced exile of LGBTQ+ individuals.
- Deaths resulting from denied medical care and lack of access to essential services.
- Mass exodus of LGBTQ+ Russians seeking safety and freedom abroad.



Act Four: Global Warning

It Can Happen Anywhere


OPPRUSSIAN is not just about Russia; it's a warning about the fragility of human rights and the global rise of anti-LGBTQ+ sentiment.

Highlight the increasing number of countries enacting discriminatory laws and experiencing democratic backsliding.

Peter Tatchell's warning: "Rights won can be rights lost" - a call to protect democratic values and stand up for human rights everywhere.



VISUAL STYLE CINEMATIC APPROACH



OBSERVATIONAL FOOTAGE

- Intimate vérité camera work capturing the raw reality of the situation.
- Natural lighting in safe spaces, creating a sense of intimacy and trust.
- Long-lens surveillance of protests, highlighting the tension and danger.
- Handheld urgency in action sequences, immersing viewers in the heart of the action.
- Atmospheric establishing shots of Moscow, showcasing the city's grandeur and underlying tension.

INTERVIEW TREATMENT

- Shallow depth of field for key subjects, drawing focus to their emotions and experiences.
- Dramatic shadow play for anonymous sources, protecting their identities while adding visual intrigue.
- Location-based contextual backgrounds, grounding the interviews in the reality of the situation.
- Split-screen for remote interviews, connecting voices across borders.
- Environmental portraits of public figures, providing context and insight into their roles.

COVERT FOOTAGE

- Raw hidden camera material, adding a layer of authenticity and immediacy.
- Surveillance footage aesthetic, creating a sense of paranoia and surveillance.
- Body-worn camera sequences, providing a first-person perspective of the events.
- Phone footage from protests, capturing the chaos and energy of the resistance.
- Encrypted video calls, showcasing the challenges of communication and activism in a repressive environment.

ARCHIVAL INTERGRATION

- Soviet-era LGBTQ+ documentation, providing historical context and a glimpse into the past.
- News footage from past protests, highlighting the ongoing struggle for LGBTQ+ rights.
- Peter's historical campaign footage, showcasing his long history of activism.
- Social media video evidence, adding a contemporary perspective and showcasing the power of digital platforms.
- Police bodycam material, providing a chilling glimpse into the brutality of the crackdown.

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


